Portrait of HP: Jennifer Price

"From bold beginnings to community champion".

For some time now, Jennifer and I had wanted to collaborate to create portraits that told stories, that said something, that made us think and reflect. By the virtue of a coincidence or you name it, this 16th volume of Portrait of HP falls on the same date as Jennifer's tenth anniversary at HP.

A decade ago we shared the HP induction course (me transferring from HP Mexico to HP UK&I). I have this vivid memory of not being able to grasp all she was telling me, partly due to her lovely and peculiar accent, and partly because of my limited English proficiency at the time. My main takeaway from that conversation was her passion about horses.

Jennifer's arrival at the IT industry was indeed interesting. It all started like for many of us, one day she decided she needed to find a job. However, very few dare to execute it the way she did. Jennifer went straight to the TechData reception with her CV in hand, a smile, and that certainty that she could bring value to the company. Those who know Jennifer won't be surprised that she had been hired, initially in the administrative team supporting Retail, but thanks to her natural talent for making connections she quickly progressed to the position of Senior Account Manager.

Fast forward a few years, while working for a South Korean company, she faced cultural differences where, as a woman, she was expected to pursue subordinate roles. This realisation nurtured Jennifer's growing dissonance between the privileges of working for a large corporation and her gender equality principles.

Her professional network led her to work for HP, where she quickly realised that the sense of community is central to the company, where colleagues and leaders showed "empathetic, caring, and nurturing" attitudes. Rather than isolated actions, these remain part of the HP everyday culture. When it was her turn to become a mother, the saying "it takes a village to raise a child" gained a different meaning: she recognised that sense of community within HP once again, which remains among the reasons she believes HP is an "employer for life".

We also discussed the importance of role models. For Jennifer it has become essential to learn from inspiring female leaders. For the first time in her direct management chain, she announced in a proud voice, there was a woman as a leader. For Jennifer, the arrival of Stephanie Dismore to NWE became a source of consistent inspiration:

"If you can see it, you can do it."

Finally, Jennifer shared her love for horses with me. After 10 years, I finally confirmed I had understood her correctly. Also, her passion for building and supporting communities; currently, Jenn is Co-Chair of the UK&I Women BRG, where she has been able to develop activities and mentoring programmes for women, in particular around sustainability. Most notably, not only within HP, but also via partnership with Tottenham Spurs Foundation.

Let's celebrate these 10 years that HP has been nurtured by Jennifer's passion and dedication. With this volume of Portrait of HP may I extend an invitation to inspire us and remind of the importance of working to create a better community.

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
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
